## Thank you to all for an extraordinary Holy Week!

## Easter Time

So, we are at the beginning of the great liturgical season of fifty days known as Easter Time. The *Circular Letter Concerning the* 

Preparation and Celebration of the Easter Feasts reminds us, "The celebration of Easter is prolonged throughout the Easter season. The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday are celebrated as one feast day, the 'great Sunday." (#100)

That's quite a challenge, isn't it — to keep the joy, festivity, and enthusiasm going for fifty days so that the entire period is celebrated as one "great Sunday." Yet, that is indeed the challenge the Church gives to us, because Easter is that important. The central mystery of the death and resurrection of Christ must take center place in our life. I like to think that we are ("merely") continuing along in the midst of the **great 90 days of Lent-Easter!** Remember, it's always the total Paschal Mystery of both the Lord's death and resurrection that we are always celebrating.

How will you make the 50 days of Easter Time special and significant in your spiritual life, as I'm sure the 40 days of Lent were? Will you continue to attend daily Mass as perhaps you did during Lent? Will you be using our *Little White Book* of Easter Time reflections? What additional prayer will you be doing during Easter Time? Give yourself the gift of really immersing yourself in the joy and new life of the 50 days of Easter Time!

## First Communion Season

Fasten your seat belts, because as of this Saturday, it's "away we go" with our Saturday First Communion Masses! This coming Saturday, May 3, followed by next Saturday, May 10, we will be having two Masses each day for First Holy Communions. What a wonderful time it is for the children and their families as these children now deepen their intimacy and union with the Lord Jesus by partaking of the gift of His Body and Blood!
